Educate your children about the dangers of fireworks...



Each Fourth of July, thousands of people, most often children and teens, are injured while using consumer fireworks. Despite the dangers of fireworks, few people understand the associated risksdevastating burns, other injuries, fires, and even death.



Facts & Figures

In 2009, fireworks caused an estimated 18,000 reported fires, including 1,300 total structure fires, 400 vehicle fires, and 16,300 outside and

other fires. These fires resulted in no reported civilian deaths, 30 civilian injuries and \$38 million in direct property damage.

In 2009, U.S. hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 8,800 people for fireworks related injuries; 53% of 2009 emergency room fireworksrelated injuries were to the extremities and 42% were to the head.

The risk of fireworks

injury was highest for children ages 10-14, with more than twice the risk for the general population.
